


My Papi Has A Motorcycle

READ

Before

- Read the book title and ask your child(ren):
 - Have you ever seen someone riding a motorcycle?
 - Have you ever wondered about riding a motorcycle?
- Prior to reading the book say: “Daisy’s family moved from Mexico to the United States. Each day after Papi gets home from work, he takes Daisy on a motorcycle ride around their neighborhood. Let’s take a look at their neighborhood.”

During

- Ask your child(ren) questions such as:
 - How did the neighbors greet Daisy and Papi on their ride?
 - Why didn’t they stop and enjoy shaved ice?
 - Did they stop by Papi’s work?
 - Tell me about Papi’s work.

After

- After reading, review the story by asking questions such as:
 - What was Daisy’s favorite part of the ride?
 - How could you tell they were going fast?
 - Would you like to ride a fast motorcycle around your neighborhood?



PLAY

Let’s Learn Kentucky - Connect Together

Early relationships are the building blocks for healthy growth and development. Building daily habits of connection, learning about emotions, and cooperating with others will help your child develop healthy habits for daily life.

Our Community Map*

- Explain to your child that you are part of a community. There are many types of communities, such as schools, neighborhoods, and places of worship. Tell your child that today you will explore a community that is special to your family.
- Sit down with your child and tell them that you are going to make a map of your community. Start by drawing where your family lives. Write your family’s name or address on your drawing. Choose two or three special places in your community—like a store, library, school, or place of worship. Label those on your drawing, too.
- Make a plan with your child to visit these places in your community over the next few weeks. When you visit, take your map with you. Have your child draw any new places they see on the map. Ask your child what place they like to visit in your community.

Make It Easier

Start with a map of where your family lives. Draw the people who live with you and a few things around your home such as trees, cars, buildings, or pets.

Extend the Learning

Ask your child to think of the different people who live and work in your community. Begin to add them to your map and label them.
